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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Public Utility District No. 1 of Okanogan County from January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2018.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the year ended December 31, 2018, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Customer accounts – adjustments, cash receipts, and past due accounts
- Payroll – gross wages, overtime, other compensation, and leave accrual
- Accounts payable – general disbursements and credit card transactions

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Public Utility District No. 1 of Okanogan County was established in 1936 by a public vote and began operation in 1945 to provide energy services to Okanogan County. The District provides energy to more than 21,000 residential, commercial, industrial, and irrigation accounts. The District owns and operates an electrical distribution system incorporating both electrical and telecommunication facilities and equipment. Along with the headquarters in Okanogan, the District also has satellite offices in Oroville, Tonasket, Omak, Brewster, and Twisp.

An elected, three-member Board of Commissioners governs the District. The Board appoints management to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its 95 full-time employees. For fiscal years 2017 and 2018, the District operated on an annual budget of about \$47 million and \$48 million, respectively.
